New blinds for the centre



The Bush Schools corridor has had a make-over. The resources on display were showing signs of sun damage and the decision was made to install new blinds. The system is based on 2 blinds – one is a block out blind which can be raised during opening hours, the other blind can remain in place and is a translucent blind, which allows filtered light to enter into the corridor.
